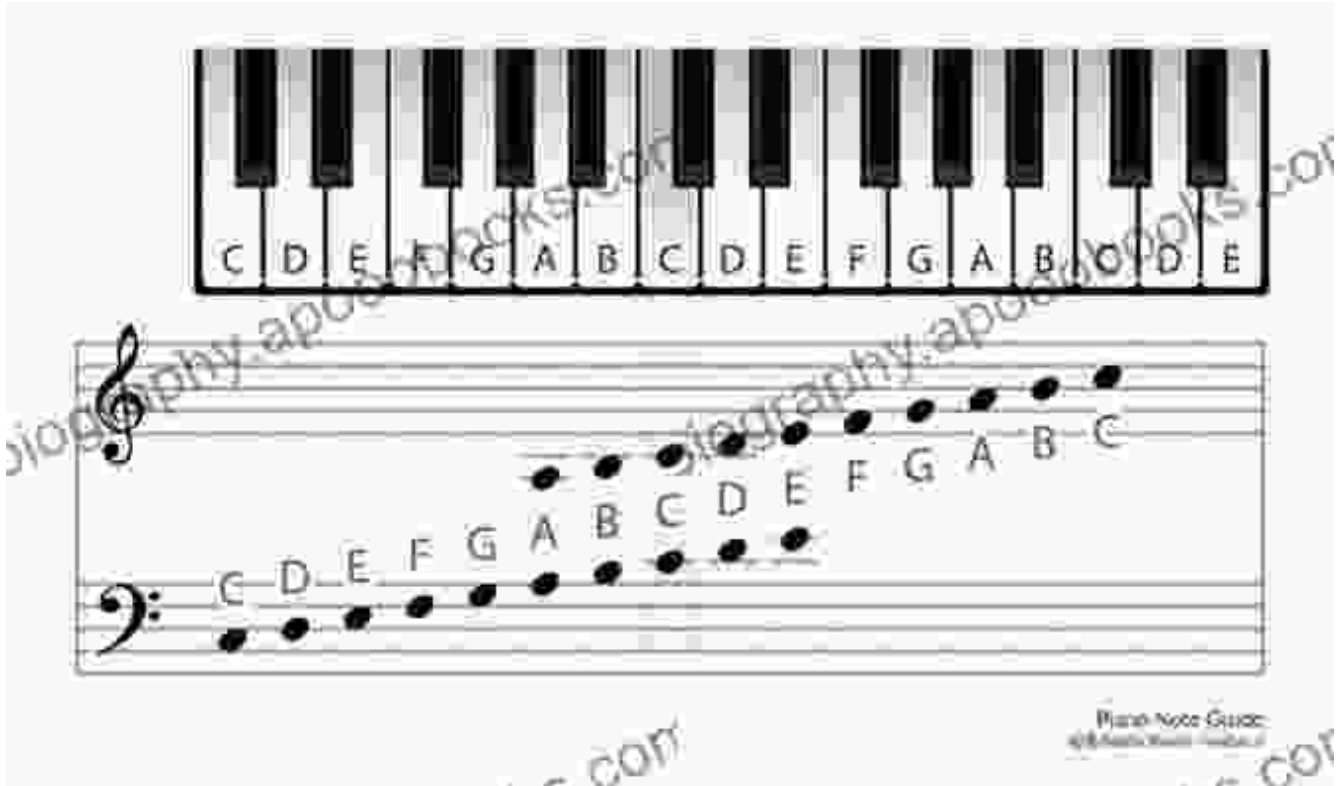

Notes and Rests

Time Signatures and Bar Lines

Time signatures determine the number of beats per measure and the type of note that receives one beat. Bar lines divide the music into regular units called measures.

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Chapter 3: Understanding Musical Symbols

Articulations and Dynamics

Articulations indicate how notes should be played, such as staccato (short and detached) or legato (smooth and connected). Dynamics control the volume and intensity of the music.

Word	Common Abbreviations	English Definition and Description	Symbol
Accent		Marked. Note to be played more forcefully than those before or after it	
Forza	fz	With force. Strongly accented.	
Glissando	Gliss.	Glide. A rapid glide or slide up or down between two notes, playing all of the notes in between.	
Legato		Tied together. Notes are played slurred together, with no breaks in between.	
Marcato	Marc.	Marked. Note or passage to be played more forcefully than those before or after it (also called an accented note)	
Rinforzando	rfz	Reinforcing.	
Sforzando	Sfz.	Using force.	
Staccatissimo		Very detached. Notes are played as an exaggerated staccato.	
Staccato	Stacc.	Detached. Notes are played short and separated from one another.	
Tenuto		Sustained. Hold the note for its full length.	

Accidentals and Key Signatures

Accidentals modify the pitch of a note, either raising or lowering it. Key signatures indicate the set of sharps or flats that apply to a piece of music, establishing its tonality.



Ultimate Music Theory - Accidental Rules - Accidentals & Key Signatures!

An Accidental is a double flat ($\flat\flat$), a flat (\flat), a natural (\natural), a sharp (\sharp) and a double sharp ($\sharp\sharp$).

An **Accidental found in the music** is called an "Accidental". An Accidental written on the staff (or on a ledger line) applies only to the notes on that line or in that space within that measure.

Accidentals that are found at the **beginning of each line of music** are in the "Key Signature". These sharps or flats apply to all notes on the staff (and ledger lines) with the same letter name.

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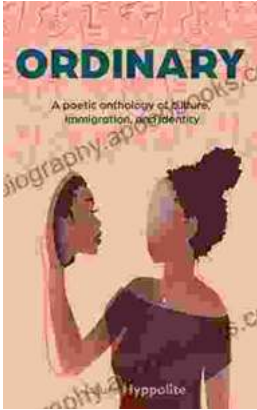
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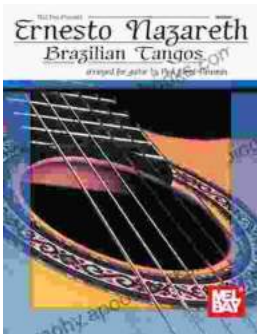
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
